- **-Primary sources:** original sources created *at the time* historical events occurred. e.g. letters, diaries, memoirs, newspapers, manuscripts, media reports, interviews, speeches, government official documents, photographs, audio/video recordings, biographies, artifacts like works of art, buildings, tools, weapons...; **-Secondary sources:** books, journal articles, conference papers, dictionaries, essays, textbooks, book
- reviews, movie reviews, PhD dissertations, <u>newspapers</u>...etc.
- **-Note:** concerning newspapers, they can be either primary or secondary sources. For example, if the article's content is original and/or first-hand account of 9-11 (current/recent event), then it is primary source. If the article describes 9-11 as a past event, then it is a secondary source.
